Loss Beyond Your Census

- Staff or volunteer (present or former)

• Results in access to information about loss with intense frequency and duration (24 hr coverage)

An Opportunity



- Hospices are uniquely, naturally suited as experts on loss and grief
- Hospice staff are skilled at and providing education and support for grief
- NHPCO Standards for Bereavement Care include providing community support

Approaches

- Unique to each hospice
- Assess program capacity
 - Include considerations for history, volunteer resources, leadership investment, and potential for community partnership
- Assess community strengths and needs
- Internal approach
- External approach
