- Impact on healthcare systems, including hospice
- Although hospice is well-versed in loss and grief, this pandemic still uniquely affects our communities, our patients, our programs and our staff

VIOLATION ASSUMPTIVE WORLD

Impact on Patients (COVID 19/Non COVID 19) Isolation (social distancing, sheltering in place)

If COVID 19+, increased feelings of guilt/shame

Fear of spreading to their families or caregivers, or vice versa




Potential for decreased autonomy and decision making



Potential for increased symptom burden beyond those of qualifying diagnosis

FEAR OF SPREAD IN HOME SETTING



FAMILIES SEPARATING/QUARANTINING

Impact on Families Prior to Death







DECREASED RESPITE OPPORTUNITIES FOR CAREGIVERS DECREASED SOCIAL SUPPORT FROM VISITORS INCREASED ANXIETY, FEAR, SADNESS, ISOLATION COMPOUNDING ANTICIPATORY

Impact on Families After Death







DIMINISHED ACCESS TO FORMAL SUPPORTS – FREQUENTLY LIMITED TO VIRTUAL



DIMINISHED ACCESS TO GRIEVING PEER COMMUNITY

Impact on Families After Death



INCREASED FEELINGS OF ANGER, GUILT, BLAME, SADNESS, DEPRESSION



ASPECTS OF GRIEF COMPOUNDED, DELAYED, AMBIGUOUS



SURVIVOR GUILT



SECONDARY AND CUMULATIVE/MULTIPLE LOSSES

Impact on Funerals and Rituals



BEREAVED UNABLE TO SEE PATIENT WHILE



BEREAVED UNABLE TO SPEND TIME WITH BODY



FUNERAL OR CREMATIONS LIMITED OR INACCESSIBLE



MEMORIAL OR LIFE CELEBRATION RITUALS

INCREASE IN REMOTE WORK, VIRTUAL HEALTHCARE TOOLS



STAFF AMBIVALENCE



INCREASED STAFF GRIEF AND DISTRESS



INCREASE IN STAFF ABSENCES, REDISTRIBUTION OF WORK



REMOTE WORK CHALLENGES

Impact on Grief Support Groups



Increase in virtual or tele-support services



Not all clients find this as meaningful or accessible



Some programs unable to provide virtual care



Opportunity for community coordination

Impact on Grief Counseling



INCREASE IN VIRTUAL OR TELE-SUPPORT SERVICES



NOT ALL CLIENTS FIND THIS AS MEANINGFUL OR ACCESSIBLE



DIFFICULTY ESTABLISHING RAPPORT VIRTUALLY



CLIENTS MORE AT HOME AND ANSWERING THE PHONE



CLIENTS OPEN TO TALKING FOR LONGER PERIODS ON THE PHONE
